The Impact of Federally Qualified Health Centers

Bucksport Regional Health Center is part of this nationwide network of locally-run health centers that serve more than 28 million people nationwide.

Community Health Centers are also a lifeline in remote, rural and underserved communities.

Highlights of health center accomplishments, nationally, include:

- Reducing unnecessary hospitalizations and unnecessary visits to the emergency room;
- Treating patients for a fraction of the average cost of one emergency room visit;
- Serving more than one in six Medicaid beneficiaries for less than two percent of the national Medicaid budget;
- Lowering the cost of children's primary care by approximately 35 percent;
- Treating 65,000 patients with Medication Assisted Therapy for opioid use disorder in 2017; and,
- Serving over 355,000 veterans throughout the country.

Community Health Centers' success in managing chronic disease in medically vulnerable communities has helped reduce health care costs for American taxpayers.

Dangers of Children or Pets in Parked Cars – What you may not know


You have probably heard that leaving children or pets in a parked car is a bad idea. Of course, leaving children in a vehicle unsupervised is never a good idea and can be considered child endangerment and neglect in many circumstances. But what about when you want to leave your dog in the car for a quick errand, when it's a mild 70 degrees out? Read on to learn why your pet is better off staying at home.

The temperature in a parked car can rise rapidly, faster than you think, even in cooler weather.

The chart above highlights just how fast the temperature can rise in a car, even when it is only 70 degrees outside.

You might think you are just popping into the store for 10 minutes, but even in that short period of time, the temperatures in your car can become lethal, especially for children and pets.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the American Veterinary Medical Association report “very little to no difference” in temperatures inside a car with windows partially open versus cars with the windows rolled up. So leaving the windows partially down is not going to help.



While many people believe that if the windows are cracked, air will flow into the car to reduce the temperature, that is simply not true.

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If you find a pet left in a hot car, the Humane Society recommends you take the following actions:

- Take down the car's make, model and license plate number.
- If there are businesses nearby, notify their managers or security guards and ask them to make an announcement to find the car's owner. Many people are unaware of the danger of leaving pets in hot cars and will quickly return to their vehicle once they are alerted to the situation.
- If the owner can't be found, call the non-emergency number of the local police or animal control and wait by the car for them to arrive.
- If you see a child left alone in a car, especially in what may be a hot car, call 9-1-1.
